University-Affiliated Schools

The University of Chicago Laboratory Schools

Founded by the renowned educator John Dewey in 1896 and located in Hyde Park, the Laboratory Schools provide an intellectually stimulating environment that promotes curiosity, inquiry, creativity, and complex problem-solving. The Lab Schools, a private school, are home to the University's youngest learners, from nursery through high school. The application for the 2024–2025 academic year became available in mid-September, and preliminary application materials are due on or before November 10, 2023.

Eligible University employees may receive at least 50% tuition remission at the Lab Schools through the University Laboratory Schools Benefit outlined in the University's Educational Assistance Plan.

UChicago Charter School

Serving approximately 1,500 students on Chicago's South Side, the UChicago Charter School (UCCS) is a public charter school within the Chicago Public Schools district. UCCS has three campuses that share a common goal to prepare 100% of its students for college acceptance and graduation through prekindergarten to 12th grade education that cultivates culturally aware critical thinkers and leaders. UCCS generally makes applications available in early October with a final due date in late February for the upcoming academic year.

Local Public School Resources

The Chicago Public Schools's mission is to provide a high-quality public education for every child, in every neighborhood, preparing each student for success in college, career, and civic life. Chicago Public Schools or CPS has 634 schools serving approximately 322,000 students. CPS schools offer diverse curriculum and programs with high academic standards, instructional supports, and extracurricular activities for every child in every neighborhood from Pre-K through 12th grade.

Please note that you will need to have a <u>confirmed street address</u> to confirm which CPS neighborhood schools your children are eligible to attend.

Chicago Public School Eligibility Requirements

In order to determine which CPS school your child is eligible to attend, you will need to confirm your neighborhood school attendance boundaries based on your address using CPS' school locator tool.

- Locate your area Pre-K School
- Locate your area K-12 School

Please note that you will need proof of your address and your Chicago residency to begin the enrollment process. Before signing a lease or purchasing a home, you can also call the school to confirm that your home address will be in the school's attendance area.

Chicago Public School Enrollment

Students in grades K-12 have a guaranteed seat at the general education program in their neighborhood school. While many local schools also offer Pre-K, the CPS Pre-K process is separate from enrolling your child in a neighborhood school.

Please review the <u>Pre-K Schooling</u> section for specific information about applying to CPS Pre-K.

CPS highly recommends contacting your neighborhood school directly and/or visiting the school in person. The documentation you will need for each school varies, so we recommend both reviewing the <u>suggested documents on this site</u> and speaking directly with your neighborhood school. Tell the relevant school(s) that you are seeking to enroll or register your child and ask what documents you need to bring to the school and when you should visit in person.

Pre-K Local Public Schooling

This section provides information about in-school Pre-K options for children at least 4 years old. For childcare resources that are non-school-based, please see Childcare Resources.

Chicago Public Schools have high-quality early learning programs in every Chicago neighborhood. CPS Pre-K Programs offer free full-day programs for every four-year-old, while Community-Based Preschool and Early Learning Programs, including Head Start and Early Head Start, serve children from prenatal to age 5. When you apply to CPS Pre-K, you rank your preferences, and you will receive offers to a Pre-K program based on your address and your preferences. Pre-K programs can take children from outside of their neighborhood area if seats are available.

Pre-K Enrollment

The CPS website provides five clear steps required to enroll in a CPS Pre-K program. Families who have questions can also view the CPS Early Learning FAQs or call the Family Support Hotline at 312-229-1690.

Pre-K Enrollment (UChicago Charter Schools)

The UChicago Charter School also accepts applications for Pre-K. Additional information can be found on their Admissions site.

Additional Local School Options

Two local Hyde Park private schools also offer school-based Pre-K programs:

- The Ancona School, rooted in the Montessori tradition, is a child-centered school that builds a strong academic foundation and a joy of learning in Pre-K through 8th grade students.
- Akiba Schechter Jewish Day School is a private Jewish day school that serves a wide range of students from across the Chicago area. Students who do not identify as Jewish are welcome in their Pre-K/Nursery programs.

K-12 Local Public Schooling

All children from birth to age 21 who live in Chicago are eligible for enrollment in a Chicago Public School.

CPS provides a wide range of high-quality educational programs and engaging learning environments that meet the individual needs of all students and prepare them for success in college, career, and civic life. Chicago students can either attend the general education program of their neighborhood school or apply to attend nearly any school in the city that they are eligible for and that has available seats.

Families can utilize the School Profile Search to find the school or program that's right for their child(ren). The School Profile Search tool provides detailed information on a school's programs and admissions requirements, afterschool activities, family support services, and school performance reports, among other helpful information.

<u>Chicago School Options</u> is a resource site created by local parents¹ about private and public schools in the Chicago area with information about a diverse range of schools, enrollment, and parent tips and experiences.

Enroll in Your Neighborhood School

Students in grades K-12 have a guaranteed seat at the general education program in their neighborhood school. No GoCPS application is required. After identifying your <u>local school based on your home</u> <u>address</u>, please reach out to the school directly if you wish to enroll or have questions for the school.

Applying to Any CPS School

The Chicago Public School system offers the ability for students to apply to other schools within the city, regardless of where they live. Please see <u>Applying to Nearly Any School in Chicago with GoCPS</u> for more information.

Applying to Nearly Any School in Chicago with GoCPS

GoCPS allows families to explore and apply to nearly any CPS school and program through one online platform. Research all of your school and program options, submit your application, and then receive your offers the spring after you submit your application. GoCPS is the Chicago Public Schools' site that allows both current and new families to explore and apply to nearly every CPS school and program through one online platform.

Visit the GoCPS school search tool to research CPS schools.

Each year in mid-September, CPS opens their GoCPS application, which allows families to apply to send their students to schools anywhere within the CPS system.

As of **September 13, 2023**, the GoCPS application window for the 2024-2025 school year is open and now accepting applications. The application closes on November 9, 2023, at 5:00pm. Applications are NOT processed on a first-come, first-served basis. Students will have the same chance of being accepted to their selected programs whether they apply early or by November 9, 2023. The Rolling Waitlist

In addition to being able to apply to other schools throughout the city for the following school year, families have the option to apply to a school's Rolling Waitlist. The Rolling Waitlist is for families who did not originally apply in the Fall and would like to transfer sooner or who want to add additional programs to their application.

Apply by Grade: PreK

Apply by Grade: Elementary (K-8)

Elementary schools focus on allowing children to develop social skills as well as cognitive and thinking skills. CPS is home to more than 470 elementary schools that offer a wide variety of program options to meet the academic interests of students. Elementary schools serve children who live in Chicago from kindergarten through 8th grade. Students can either attend the general education program of the neighborhood school in the attendance boundary of their primary home address or apply to attend any elementary school in the city that they are eligible for and that has available seats. Apply by Grade: High School (9-12)

High schools offer rigorous curriculum, extracurricular activities, and counseling resources that help students plan and prepare for success in life after graduation. CPS is home to more than 160 high schools that offer a wide variety of program options to meet the academic interests of students.

Students can either attend the general education program of the neighborhood school within the attendance boundary of their primary home address or apply to attend any high school in the city that they are eligible for and that has available seats. High schools serve children who live in Chicago from 9th through 12th grade. CPS students use the GoCPS enrollment tool to apply to 9th grade. Students applying or transferring to grades 10-12 should contact the school directly.

Educational Resources for Diverse Learners

Diverse Learners Tuition Portability Benefit

The <u>Diverse Learners Tuition Portability Benefit</u> ("Diverse Learners Benefit") is a taxable tuition benefit available for eligible employees whose child attends one of three eligible schools: City Elementary, Hyde Park Day School, or Wolcott College Prep. The Diverse Learners Tuition Portability Benefit Application form becomes available each spring.
